
about life at high school — now we answer!



Your courses explained

ACTIVE LIVING & FITNESS LEADERSHIP

The goals of this course are that students have the opportunity to acquire and evaluate exercise science and strength and conditioning related research and information. Students will develop skill in making knowledgeable decisions to improve physical fitness and athletic performance, and develop positive attitudes towards physical training and exercise science.

BAND 9

This course focuses on the continued development of musicianship through instrumental performance of quality band repertoire, technical studies and listening to/viewing and analysis of appropriate models.

CHOIR 9

This course introduces students to the fundamentals of choral singing by developing vocal technique, musical literacy, ear training and listening skills. Students explore a diverse selection of choral repertoire representing numerous styles of music, historical periods, cultures and languages. Students learn to harmonize and develop the expressive techniques of performance

CATHOLIC STUDIES 9

The aim of Catholic Studies is for students to understand, value and engage in Catholic Christianity so they may hear an invitation, or deepen their commitment, to live as followers of Jesus Christ. Students studying this curriculum come to understand the goal of the Catholic church is to unite humanity with God in love. The Catholic Studies 9 curriculum focuses in part on the importance of community in supporting and deepening one's faith.

DRAMA 9

The Drama course is intended to introduce the student to the basic elements of drama. The class will involve character development, examining and creating scenes, improvisation, monologue, and various other drama techniques.

ENGLISH 9 A & B

Read modern stories and stories from long ago! Discuss ideas, such as values and relationships, and discover the conflicts the characters experience. Relate these ideas to your own life and share them with others in an essay. Research advertising techniques to create media projects.

HEALTH 9

This class will develop understanding and skills necessary to take action to improve health; help to make informed decisions based on health-related knowledge; and apply decisions that will improve personal health and/or the health of others. Topics covered will be: safety, non-curable infections/diseases, chronic illness, healthy food, addictions, tragic death and suicide.

HOME ECONOMICS 9

Students will gain a basic knowledge of clothing care and basic hand sewing skills. Students will explore food and its sourcing along with linking basic nutritional concepts and issues as part of consumerism and a healthy lifestyle. They will also focus on learning practical cooking skills. This course also includes an introduction to financial literacy with a focus on basic budgeting and financial decision making.

Your courses explained

MATHEMATICS 9

Explore mathematical concepts using hands-on materials, graphing calculators and other technologies. You will develop equations of straight lines in analytic geometry and explore relationships between volume and surface area of objects in measurement. Algebraic and reasoning skills will be applied to solve realistic problems.

PHYSICAL EDUCATION 9

A class designed to promote and encourage lifelong participation in physical activity and the development of a commitment to overall well being through physical fitness.

PRACTICAL & APPLIED ARTS SURVEY 9

This Industrial Arts program is designed to incorporate safety, theory and practical shop time. The class will focus on Woods, CNC design, Drafting and Welding

ROCK BAND 9

Students must audition for a role in the Sacred Heart Rock Band—Channel 22. Students accepted will develop individual and group techniques and routines in preparation for public performances. Students are expected to participate in some sessions and performances that take place outside of school hours.

INFORMATION PROCESSING

Information Processing 10 offers students an introduction to the ever changing world of computers and technology. Students are given the opportunity to explore several computer software applications that are used for word processing, information exchange and design. They will demonstrate these skills in the various projects that they complete throughout the course.

SCIENCE 9

This course is a general science survey course with units focusing on space, chemistry, electricity and reproduction. The connections among science, technology and

SOCIAL STUDIES 9

The Grade 9 course is a program that studies the relationship between the past and present, covering history from the beginning of mankind (prehistory) to the present day. Students will consider how worldviews are shaped and how they are expressed while living in particular times and places.

VISUAL ART 9

The aim of the Arts Education curriculum is to enable students to understand and value art expressions through life. Arts Education 9 will focus on the theme—taking action. This conceptual focus will provide opportunities for students to make meaningful interdisciplinary connections and achieve deeper understandings.
